The information reported in this document is used to keep the Governor and staff apprised of accomplishments, key issues, and upcoming events as they relate to the Department of Liquor Licenses and Control, and its three divisions (Licensing, Administration, and Investigations) on a monthly basis.

GRANTS & FUNDING LIQUOR ENFORCEMENT & EDUCATION OUTREACH GRANT CUB (COVERT UNDERAGE BUYER) PROGRAM

In an effort to curb the sale of liquor to underage persons, the Covert Underage Buyer (CUB) program was instituted in May of 2003. This program provides the resources necessary for DLLC to investigate reported complaints of liquor licensed businesses suspected of one or more underage liquor law violations. When there is reasonable suspicion to believe that a liquor-licensed establishment is selling liquor to underage customers, the department will send in a CUB to attempt to purchase liquor. CUBs are between the ages of sixteen (16) and nineteen (19), and carefully trained by DLLC investigators to understand and follow state laws, including DLLC's CUB investigations guidelines and personal and public safety measures. Currently there are two (2) officers and a total of seven (7) trained CUBs performing CUB operations for the department. DLLC provides CUB program training to all Arizona law enforcement agencies, allowing the program to operate statewide.

In February 2014, DLLC conducted investigations of sixteen (16) liquor-licensed establishments in Tucson, Apache Junction, Mesa, Phoenix, Peoria, New River, and Scottsdale. Six (6) CUBs were used. Five (5), or thirty-one (31.3%) percent, of these establishments sold alcohol to a CUB resulting in nine (9) criminal citations and eleven (11) administrative violations. All sixteen (16) locations were investigated in response to complaints received by DLLC.

Since the inception of the program, three thousand five hundred thirty-three (3,533) establishments have been investigated and one thousand eighty-nine (1,089) or thirty-one (30.8%) percent have sold to CUB buyers resulting in two thousand six hundred seventeen (2,617) administrative violations and two thousand one hundred forty (2,140) criminal citations.

SUCCESS STATISTICS INVESTIGATIONS

It is the responsibility of the Investigations Division to ensure that all licensees adhere to A.R.S. Title 4 (Arizona liquor law) and all Arizona Administrative Code Rules established by the DLLC.

Investigators completed two hundred eighty-nine (289) routine liquor inspections (RLIs) at licensed establishments and events throughout Arizona resulting in sixty-nine (69) criminal citations and seventy-two (72) administrative violations. The following success statistics were completed by a staff of fourteen (14) full time sworn officers who uphold a statewide officer-to-liquor license ratio of 1:846.

Total investigative actions taken this month were one thousand two hundred forty-nine (1,249), which is an increase of thirty-four (34.4%) percent when compared to the nine hundred twenty-nine (929) investigative actions taken in February 2013.

Underage persons who are cited for consuming appear to be closer to the legal drinking age. Of the citations issued to underage persons, thirty-seven (37.0%) percent were within one year and thirty-two (31.5%) percent were within two years of the legal drinking age.

The number of citations issued due to furnishing alcohol to an underage, underage in possession, and consumption decreased eighty-four (85.4%) percent from February 2013. The number of citations issued for alcohol in system of underage decreased fifteen (14.8%) percent. The number of citations issued due to use of false ID to buy alcohol decreased forty-two (41.7%) percent. The number of citations issued due to unlawful use of a driver's license increased to nine (9) in February 2014 from six (6) in February 2013 or by fifty (50.0%) percent.

SUCCESS STATISTICS LIQUOR LICENSE AUDITS

The Audit Unit monitors and performs audits of two types of liquor-licensed establishments; hotel/motel with restaurant (series 11) and restaurants (series 12). Audits are conducted to ensure that restaurants are not operating as bars and are maintaining a 40:60 food-to-liquor sales ratio which is required by Title 4.

Currently there are one hundred sixty-nine (169) active Series 11 (hotel/motel) licenses and three thousand four hundred forty-two (3,442) active Series 12 (restaurant) licenses statewide. Compared to February 2013, the number of hotel/motel with restaurant licenses increased by four (4) or two (2.4%) percent, and the number of restaurant licenses increased by sixty-nine (69) or two (2.0%) percent.

DLLC employs two (2) full time auditors. With a total of three thousand six hundred eleven (3,611) restaurant-type licenses combined, the statewide auditor-to-liquor license ratio is: 1:1,806.

The Compliance Unit governs the dispute-resolution process and imposes disciplinary actions against licensees for violations of State liquor laws. The Compliance Unit is responsible for determining an appropriate course of disciplinary action which may consist of verbal or written warnings, consent agreements, or referral for a full administrative hearing.

Economic Impact:

Fines collected in the month totaled twenty-seven thousand five hundred (\$27,500) dollars from thirty-six (36) adjudicated compliance actions. Compared to last month, January 2014, this represents a twenty (19.8%) percent increase in collected revenues and an eight (7.7%) percent decrease in the number of compliance actions processed. Compared to February 2013, this represents a fifty (49.6%) percent decrease in collected revenues and an eighteen (18.2%) percent decrease in the number of compliance actions processed.

A penalty payment plan gives licensees the option to pay fines in installments rather than in one lump sum. DLLC and the licensee agree to the terms of the payment plan during the negotiation process. Although the payment plan may reduce DLLC's monthly collection of fine revenues in the short term, the long term outcome is intended to keep establishments in business by easing the financial burden of fines during the current economic decline.

SUCCESS STATISTICS LICENSE DIVISION

The License Division is responsible for processing new license applications, permits, renewals, and maintaining up-to-date and accurate information on active licenses. Compared to this month last year, February 2013, the number of new liquor licenses issued in Arizona decreased by nineteen (18.5%) percent, the number of renewals decreased by seven (7.3%) percent, and the number of active licenses increased by one (1.1%) percent. Also, compared with February 2013, monthly licensing revenues have decreased by five (4.9%) percent from three hundred fifty thousand one hundred fifty-three (\$350,153) dollars during this time last year to three hundred thirty-three thousand one hundred fifty-one (\$333,151) dollars during the current month.

In February 2014, eight (8) exempt locations were approved which brings the total active exempt locations in Arizona to one hundred two (102). An exempt location is an establishment that has: (1) met the criteria established in A.R.S. §4-244.05 and A.A.C. R19-1-113, (2) made application for the exemption, (3) been inspected by a DLLC investigator, and (4) been issued a one-year exemption which allows patrons to bring and consume beer and wine on the premises.

Audit Workshops

DLLC will hold two Arizona Restaurant Liquor Licensee Audit Workshops. One will be in Lake Havasu City on Wednesday, May 14, 2014 and the other in Flagstaff on Wednesday, May 7, 2014. There is no charge to attend. The goals of the workshop are to:

- 1. Create the opportunity to talk with licensees and understand new trends/challenges in the restaurant industry;
- 2. Improve restaurateur's understanding of the need to achieve liquor law compliance;
- 3. Discuss law changes that may open new revenue streams for the hospitality industry;
- 4. Keep responsible restaurant operators in business; and
- 5. Discuss options that may reduce the regulatory paperwork burden on licensees.

Registration for workshops and training offered by the department is now available online.

Public Meetings

DLLC, local law enforcement, and neighborhood associations will meet to address liquor establishment trends that impact parents and teens. These public meetings, dates and locations will be posted on the Department's website in April 2014.

Liquor License Lottery

A liquor license lottery will be held in April/May 2014. Applications will be accepted beginning Monday, April 21, 2014 and ending on Friday, May 16, 2014.

Independent appraisers have established the fair market values (FMV) for lottery licenses. When all fifteen (15) counties meet population increase requirements for new license issuance, the lottery has produced up to \$2,975,355 in revenues. This year new licenses will be offered in four (4) counties. Proceeds from the lottery are deposited into the General Fund.

When the number of applicants exceeds the number of lottery licenses offered, a random selection drawing is held. If necessary, this year's drawing will be held on Monday, June 2, 2014.

FMVs, application forms, instructions, the lottery timeline, and random selection drawing details will be posted on the DLLC website on April 4, 2014.
